CONCERNS... After many years of neglect, the NHS have at long last put forward a proposal to redevelop the Northwood & Pinner Cottage Hospital site.

We know many local residents will be greatly impacted by these plans. The NHRA has strong concerns and we believe much better proposals could – and should – be put forward.

The facility is supposed to be the new Medical Hub for the whole of Northern Hillingdon, but we can see little evidence of this in the proposals, which are sketchy. Whereas great detail has been considered about the blocks of flats, for example, in terms of the landscaped outside and roof gardens.

There is a desperate need for "Step-Down" accommodation for adults discharged from hospital – with no ongoing medical need to stay in hospital, but who cannot immediately return home. Despite this having been discussed in the past, none is being provided in this proposal.

There is also a great need for "Sheltered" accommodation for people who are normally able to live quite independently, but need occasional support. Sheltered accommodation would have a Warden on site who can be called in an emergency, as well as other features such as emergency fire and personal alarm systems. Again, none is being provided in this proposal.

If built, the two huge blocks of 70 flats which are being proposed on the existing Heath Centre site (and much of the Cottage Hospital site), would be over-dominant and impact the lives of local residents. In particular, those in Juniper Close who we know are unhappy about the proposals.

Insufficient residents' parking is being proposed for the new flats, and there is nothing to stop

them from using the parking destined for the new health centre. Nor has any consideration been given to the additional traffic using the roundabout (for the 70 new homes).

In addition, we understand that if planning consent is granted, the intention is for NHS Property Services to sell off the existing Health Centre site and part of the old hospital site, to a commercial developer who would then be free to submit their own different proposals. That is not acceptable. See the yellow area on the plan which will be the two new blocks of flats.



This is a unique opportunity to provide much needed 'state of the art' facilities for the area which must not be lost. Both NHRA and Northwood Residents' Association will be jointly petitioning against the current proposals with NHS, our MP, London Borough of Hillingdon directly and via the Webinar link.



What is it? Like the NHRA, BBP is a not-forprofit organisation focused on fighting food waste because of the misconceptions on food labelling.

According to the latest figures from government body

WRAP, by weight household food waste makes up around 70% of the UK postfarm-gate total. WRAP estimates that by cutting food waste each average household could save up to £700 per year as well as making less waste.

Education: Their mission is to raise awareness at different levels: From consumers – to retail chains.

In Northwood Hills, Uparima Goonetillake runs their main food distribution warehouse at Ryfield Crescent, assisted by 20-30 volunteers. Food is distributed to individuals and charities within approximately 10 miles radius.

Where does the food come from? The volunteers collect from around 10 supermarkets a day – each supermarket who participates assigns them a specific day. For ease of storage, items are mostly tins and jars, and some toiletries. We have very limited storage for chilled and frozen foods so tend to pass those on asap.



Where does it go? BBP redistribute unwanted but still safe food to those in need. Thousands of tons have been given to individuals and charities food past its Best Before date over the years. Saving an enormous amount of energy, resources and avoiding products going to landfill, while feeding thousands of people.

Supporting individuals and the homeless with food and clothing.

BBP give directly to people in need of food. At this time, there is also a great need for warm clothing for people living outdoors (Eg socks, scarves, shoes, dark-coloured coats – as the recipients often do not have access to washing facilities).

As Covid restrictions permit, BBP is hoping to open the doors again at Ryfield Crescent from mid-March on Wednesdays for the public to either bring donations or receive food (10am to 1pm).



Get involved People volunteer for a number of different reasons, including learning new skills, having fun, making a difference and gaining experience to put on their CVs. Some are really devoted to the cause while others simply wish to do their bit where they can. Every little or large amount of help is welcome.

The Council have kept busy with refuse, recycling collections and street cleaning through these incredibly challenging times but, unfortunately, it is still a rare sight to see completely litter-free roads throughout the ward.

But you can do your bit... As reported on the NHRA Facebook page and Next-Door, fortunately a few volunteers are still doing their bit to clear discarded rubbish in their own local areas. It is noticeable that much of the litter spread occurs on rubbish/recycling collection days and is caused by foxes and rodents who tear open bags, then remove and scatter the contents. If you can ensure your recycling is securely packed and make sure your general waste is also secure (double-bagged if needed, or preferably

binned with a lid) it will help the Council Collectors and also alleviate some of our litter problems. We can all understand that the "bin men" don't have time to pick up scattered items.

Unsightly litter is also often found along our footpaths, hedges and verges so if you see areas in need of clearing why not post the details on the NHRA Facebook page to see if you can recruit some litter vigilantes to help you deal with a local problem. It is a fact that one piece of litter tends to lead to more being dropped, so this might help to break the cycle.



Finally, we all know how unpleasant dog poo encounters can be. If you are a responsible dog owner, I'm sure you do the necessary clean ups. But if you have a friend or relative walking your pet for you, please ensure they are armed with poo bags and know where bins are located.

Meet the New Council Leader Ian Edwards

It is a great honour to be voted by your peers to be the Leader of the Council and to take over from Sir Ray Puddifoot who has been instrumental in establishing Hillingdon as one of the best run councils in the country.

Council Tax Approaching the end of financial year, the Council is stronger position than anticipated with an additional £3m in uncommitted balances. Even so, we must regrettably increase our element of council tax by 1.8% for 2021/22, within our commitment to limit rises to no more 90% of that of our neighbouring boroughs.

Increasing Social Care Costs Common to just about every local authority, the full social care precept of 3% is having to be levied to meet the increasing cost in care. And the third element of the council tax bill, the Mayor of London's precept, has been increased by 9.5% meaning your total increase amounts to 5.8%.

Our defence of our environment will be undiminished and we will continue to oppose the expansion of Heathrow and will continue to fight for the best mitigation of the impacts of HS2.

I want our Council to be at the leading edge of innovation and the use of technology. We will introduce new technologies to speed up processes and reduce administrative costs. The savings made will be reinvested in our frontline services and helping to keep future council tax rises to a minimum.

We will help our young people and young families to reach their full potential.

The availability and standard of affordable housing, present a challenge that we will confront. We will work harder and faster with our police colleagues to ensure that every neighbourhood is safe and that community harms are tackled as quickly and effectively as possible.

Census or Senseless?

By the time you read this, the 2021 Census will have taken place and the next one in 2031 will be a future dream. So why do we have a census and what is their relevance today?

Censuses date back to biblical times! According to the 4th book of the Hebrew bible (numbers 1:2; 26.2) God requested a census of the Israelites during their journey from the wilderness.

In modern times, a Census gives a complete picture of the nation across the whole of the United Kingdom. It provides the Government with the information they need to develop policies, plan and run public services, and allocate funding for things such as schools, hospitals, Social Care, housing policies and much more. Since the 2001 census, based on the data collected, over £100 million has been allocated from central government to local authorities and the NHS Primary Care Trusts.

The information can be broken down to local demographics. Here are 2011 Census statistics for Northwood Hills:

Population was 11,578. Approximately 52% female and 48% Male.

Average Age is 40. While the UK Average (median) is also 40.

Where born? 69.7% of people living in the Ward were born in England. Other top answers for place of birth were 4.4% India, 2.7% Kenya, 1.7% Sri Lanka, 1.4% Ireland, 1,2% Scotland and 0.6% Wales.

Language: 86% of Northwood Hills residents spoke English as a first language.

Religion: 49.9% are Christian, 17.9% No religion, 12.6% Hindu, 6.3% Muslim and 2.6% Jewish. *20 people described themselves as a Jedi Knight and 2 people said they believed in Heavy Metal!*

Marital Status: 51.3% are married, 7.6% cohabit with a member of the opposite sex and 0.6% live with a partner of the same sex. 25.2% of people are single and 7.8% are separated or divorced.

Occupations: The top occupations are: Professional 25.2%; Associate professional and technical 14.9%; Administrative and secretarial 13.0%; Managers, directors and senior officials 12.9%

Whilst the personal details of everyone are recorded, that information is kept confidential for 100 years, after which future generations will be able to find out more about the personal lives of everyone.

Harlyn and the Coronavirus

Since March 2020 we have successfully 'reinvented' the school a number of times. This has included early and enhanced remote learning systems, two versions of key worker/vulnerable child provision, partial reopening for certain Year Groups and also a full reopening in September.

It has certainly been a busy and flexible period for ours and all schools.

We have developed our remote learning provision to include **Google Classroom**. This is an online platform where children log in to view their tasks, complete them and virtually hand them back in. It also provides a secure chat facility, so that children can stay in touch with their teachers and discuss their work.

We have also been providing 'in school' education to a large number of children during lockdown times. These have mainly been the children of key worker parents, but have also included some of those deemed as being vulnerable for certain reasons.

School staff have adapted fantastically to the various changes throughout the Covid-19 period.

At the time of writing, we have been fortunate to have had very few Covid 19 cases connected with the school, following a small number of initial cases in early October 2020.

The community spirit in Northwood Hills has been tremendous and our 'thanks' go to the businesses and individuals who have donated unused laptop equipment for our children to borrow in order to enable their remote learning to continue.

We look forward to a return to 'normal' times and our usual suite of curriculum enhancements.



Edwards, new leader of Hillingdon Council. Ian has raised this with London Councils who are now making representations to the Mayor's Office of Policing and Crime (MOPAC), to secure suitable funding that will enable OWL to continue.

It has been an established network in Hillingdon Borough for quite some time and I am pleased to see that other boroughs have woken up to its value and are joining Hillingdon in pressuring the Mayor to secure future access to the service. I will do whatever I can to ensure that the network is able to continue on a more secure and permanent footing.

It was important to keep the group progressing together. They all got on extremely well and shared problems and solutions. In fact, those without any previous experience at all made the greatest progress! They have all moved on to full-size plots and cleared them before Winter!

So, when we can start letting plots again, we can cater for both beginners and the more experienced. Open air and healthy exercise, with the added bonus of fresh food!



Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch

Hillingdon Neighbourhood Watch (HNW) is run by a small committee of volunteers, and in 2018 we were fortunate enough to win funding for a joint communications system between NHW and the Police, known as **Online Watch Link** or, as most people know it, "**OWL"**.



As well as being the only system that carries the police "Secured By Design" accreditation, it had already been proved successful across

Herts in getting crime information to residents by means of targeted messages sent by officers and senior NHW Coordinators, who in return received vital evidence leads. Across London there are now 15 Boroughs using OWL, and hopefully London will



secure funding for 2021-22 and will expand the use of OWL by NHW across all of 32 Boroughs.

On Hillingdon we have pioneered the use of CCTV Watch on OWL, whereby residents can register that they have a domestic CCTV system on their property, and would be willing to search it upon

request by the police in the event of a crime taking place nearby. Officers can log in to OWL and see the whole of Hillingdon on a map, and the location of residents on CCTV Watch. This speeds up the process of identifying early CCTV opportunities, and gives the contact details of the resident, thus saving officers' time. If you have a CCTV system that you've not registered on OWL, then simply email our CCTV Watch administrator at hillingdoncctv@gmail.com

We have achieved many success stories across Hillingdon in the two years that we have been using OWL, such as: recovered property identified by the rightful owner; prevention of a keyless car theft through a resident following advice to use a Faraday bag; up-to-date information on the latest scams and frauds.

The most significant achievement of 2020 being the arrest and charge of a male following a crossbow shooting – the arrest was made within 22hrs of the incident, and we were advised that without information from members on OWL CCTV Watch this would not have been the case.

It's great to hear how the Community of Northwood Hills has been pulling together during these most difficult of times. Whilst I am sure there are many other good news stories, below are just 3 that we are aware of.



Laptops and Tech for Schools

Nirav Patel (who lives in Fore St) has been taking in old laptops, refurbishing them and donating them to junior schools to



help those families who may be in need of laptops, or other tech equipment for home-schooling. Hillside Infant and Junior Schools have welcomed around 20 laptops.

"My first idea was to buy a single laptop to give to a school. But I didn't think one person would make a difference."

"So, in January via Instagram and WhatsApp I asked friends to help and I set up crowdfunding via GoFundMe, so far raising over £9,100. We have received donations from as far as Bristol, Portugal and even Los Angeles. Nirav's employer (Cargill) have offered to double the funding, so he expects to raise £30,000.

"Anyone can give from as little as £1 – it all adds up!"

The money is used to buy new laptops and at the time of going to print Nirav has delivered over 100 laptops to schools.

He said "I am in the process of setting up a charity. *This is like a second job, so if anyone has time to help me, I'd really appreciate it. Toiletries for Local Hospital Patients

Since Covid hit in April 2020, local Katherine Miles has been organising the collection of toiletries to make up Patient Care Packs for local hospitals. Initial set-up was with Brownies/Guides and now continues with student volunteers from Haydon School, who Katherine says are amazing.

"We have provided nearly 4,500 packs now and we are still going!!"



Most of the major supermarkets are generously supporting Katherine by giving her items as needed (toothbrushes etc). She particularly mentioned Morrisons.

Katherine explained why this is needed. *"Patients were arriving at hospital without basic hygiene products. Because of Covid, relatives were unable to visit and provide these essentials, so patients were going without brushing their teeth, having a shower etc. for days/weeks on end. Even without Covid overloading our local hospitals, there is still a need to support the vulnerable, elderly, single parents and homeless, who have no-one to help them"*

The packs contain: Toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, shower gel, shampoo and lotion, cereal bar and a Get Well note hand-made by the students.



Northwood Headquarters launches Environmental and Biodiversity Projects



Northwood Headquarters is a familiar landmark to many living in the area. The military headquarters is set in the grounds of what was once Eastbury Park. In 1938 the Royal Air Force took over the site for the use of RAF Coastal Command before it became a Naval unit in 1963, called 'HMS Warrior', a name by which local residents sometimes still refer to the site.



The site is now home to a number of military headquarters, representing all three services of the armed forces and international partners. However, a less wellknown fact is that staff on site are working to improve biodiversity and sustainability to minimise their impact on the environment.

Collaborative working ensures that every care is taken to reduce consumption and recycle waste where possible. Energy saving measures such as transitioning to LED lighting and powering down appliances at key times are in place across the site.

The compact site, which is highly developed and surrounded by suburban London, has a surprising amount of biodiversity potential. Projects last year included working with a local charity to introduce hedgehogs and installing hedgehog houses around the site perimeter.

An 'Environmental and Sustainability Committee' has been established and installed additional insect habitats and birdboxes. Working with the contract partner Skanska, the pond area has been dramatically renovated and is now a thriving habitat for fish, birds, small mammals and insects! The gardens and grounds have been revamped and are a haven of vibrant perennial and wild flowers which attract pollinating insects and other wildlife in the spring.

The next exciting project will see bees introduced this year, given the vital contribution they make to the ecosystem. The projects have been met with enthusiasm from staff and an unintended consequence of this has been that many are reporting an increase in their mental well-being as a result of this work.



My Favourite Lockdown Walk

During lockdown, this quiet route certainly became my favourite social-distancing walk, with or without a dog! It can easily be extended to include the Lido, Park Wood, or Copse Wood.

Summary:Northwood Recreation Ground, Haste Hill, Park Woods, Poor's Field
and Northwood Golf Course.4 Km (2 ½ miles). One hour approx. Can be very muddy in winter.

The walk starts at Northwood Recreation Ground (Chestnut Drive), there is a small car park at the pavilion (avoid match and event days). Or access can be made from Highland Road, Rochester Road (at the top of Haste Hill), Wiltshire Lane (by St Vincent's Hospital), Hills Lane, or The Drive (by Haste Hill Golf Club).

 From the Pavilion walk towards the Highland Road entrance and turn right through central gap in hedge and follow the wide diagonal path up through the meadow (cemetery on your right and good views behind), leaving via the top right-hand corner. Go straight ahead on the uphill path (behind houses on left) which offers beautiful views from the top of Haste Hill.




2) At path cross-roads (path on the left gives access to Rochester Road) carry on straight on towards St. Vincent's Nursing Home (200m) to the metal gate and enter Park Wood. Take the wide path downhill to the right with the golf course to your right and follow to the bottom where you come to the Lido perimeter fence.

3) Bear right between the fence and golf course and then, shortly after, turn left over a small bridge to an enclosed footpath beside a bridleway. Ruislip nature reserve is on your right and Haste Hill miniature railway station is on your left. Ignore turning on left which leads across the railway to the Lido. 4) Next enter Poor's Field (SSSI) via a gap in the fence and turn right. There are several tracks to follow, but keep between the nature reserve to the right and Copse Wood to the left. After 600m you can bear right in front of a pond and then over a stile and onto Northwood Golf course (left of pond is a gate without a stile). Follow straight ahead on the signed path through the golf course (beware of golf balls and keep dogs on leads). 200 metres after passing two cottages on right, the track brings you to Hills Lane, a residential road.



- 5) Do not enter the road but turn sharp-right through a copse to the golf course. Then through a second smaller copse, leaving the golf course at a metal gate. Go straight along the hedged path (behind houses on left). Pass the car park and Haste Hill GC clubhouse and then straight on down to a stream.
- 6) By the stream, take the track to the left. At the golf maintenance sheds, turn left again to bring you out into Chestnut Drive at the cemetery entrance. Follow the road and then after 50m or 100m turn right to bring you back to the Pavilion either passing by the allotments, or through the flower gardens and children's playground.



We are incredibly lucky to have this on our doorstep. Enjoy!

Do You Hate Food Waste? Remember the difference between "Best Before" and "Use By" dates?

Best Before dates are about quality, not safety. Items can still be perfectly edible after their Best Before date, though the texture or flavour might be slightly affected. The item remains perfectly safe to sell and eat.

Tips to ensure that you're eating your food at its freshest and which avoid waste at the supermarkets too:

Plan your meals so that you don't over-buy food which might not get used and think about how you can use any leftovers (eg part of the next day's meals).

Make a shopping list. Try taking a 'shelfie' – a photo of your fridge and cupboards to remind you of what's there.



Buy wonky veg and ugly fruit (this carrot amused me last night when I was preparing dinner). Doing this will encourage supermarkets to stock them, instead of those foods being wasted and unsold. Up to 20-40% fruit and vegetables are thrown away before even leaving the farm!

Remember to select the longest Best Before and Use By dates, of course, when you shop. Avoid foods that expire soon.

Use the "LOOK – SMELL – TASTE" method. Don't throw away fruit and veg just because they're past the Best Before date. They often last *much* longer, unlike other fresh products such as meat and milk.



Make smoothies, juice or soup from fruit or veggies that are past their best.

Get creative with left-overs. You might discover a new "family favourite" by experimenting with different ingredients.

Freeze suitable items if you won't be using them by the "use by" date.

Freeze leftover sauces in containers and use them to flavour future dishes!

Mix leftover yogurt with fruit and condensed milk for a simple frozen yoghurt.

Frozen fruit, vegetables and fish, are usually frozen within a few hours of being gathered and are usually cheaper, but just as nutritious as fresh. They remain fresh and you only remove the amount you need to use.

Measure out portions of rice, potatoes and pasta so you cook the right amount.

Don't throw away potato peelings! Just sprinkle with pepper, chili or other spices and crisp them in the oven. Yum! Many foods (carrots, potatoes etc) don't need peeling at all - often the maximum goodness is in the skins.



Bread that's a little stale can be baked in a moderate oven for a few minutes to refresh (with garlic and butter maybe?) or microwaved for seconds.

Bread crusts that are too small to use, can make crumbs for burgers and meatballs, thicken soup, or use for treacle tart.

Handle foods gently so they don't get bruised.

Canned foods are great for reducing food waste as they can be stored for longer. Like frozen items, fruit and veg are usually packed immediately after harvesting to preserve vitamins. But avoid cans which are dented as the contents may have perished.

Take a cooler bag shopping on warm days so that chilled food stays cool.

Immediately store perishable foods in the fridge or freezer as soon as you get home from shopping. Make sure cold air can circulate easily around the food to keep it safe.

Use the "First In, First Out" rule for storage, so the oldest items are always used first.

Who is eligible?


Postal votes are available to anyone, provided they are on the Electoral Register and are aged over 18 by 6th May 2021.

Prayer Tree



Northwood Hills had plenty of snow in January and, as is usual, our gardens and hills were a popular venue for some snow fun...


Although there were far fewer people out than usual, I'm pleased to say that I felt the rules of staying in family groups and social distancing were being observed.



This Easter, Emmanuel Parish Church Northwood celebrates 125 years of serving the local community.

In 1896 at the top of Half Mile Lane (now known as High Street), a wooden building covered with corrugated iron sheeting dubbed "The Tin Church" opened it's doors for the first time.

From the very beginning, this little building not only hosted services and prayer meetings, but was also used throughout



the week in a whole variety of ways to serve the local community. From classes for children, to technical education for adults (including tuition in nursing); dressmaking and woodcarving.

The Tin Church was also used as a Reading Room. In addition, early on a nurse was appointed to visit the sick and be a friend and sister to young women.

125 years on and Emmanuel Church continues to serve the community even amidst a pandemic. The Foodbank has never shut its doors; homecooked meals have been given out (with generous donations from local schools and pubs) and we have continued to care for new Mums through our weekly support group.



Emmanuel remains a worshiping and praying presence in the community, committed to serving Northwood, so that all may know: God is with us.

HILLSIDE JUNIOR SCHOOL

The last 12 months have certainly been unprecedented for education and society as a whole. We have had to adapt to a new way of living and working.



Despite the constant reporting that schools have been closed, Hillside Junior like many other schools have been open for key worker and vulnerable children.

Local community support We pride ourselves on the relationship we have with our local community and we are very grateful for all the support we have received. This has included the kind donation of laptops.

The Sound of Music During the Autumn Term, we welcomed the Hillingdon Music Service into our school. In a safe and socially distanced environment, every child has had the opportunity to learn an instrument.

Diversity This is also a central focus of our approach. Through our planning and class assemblies, we have identified opportunities to celebrate lives of inspirational individuals who have made a significant difference.



Walk a Daily Mile We look forward to welcoming everyone back to school. Our field is now in full use with the addition of a "Daily Mile" track installed in November. This has already had a huge impact on the physical wellbeing of our community. We are making further improvements to the playground with the purchase of additional equipment. This will help to improve the social well-being of our children after so many months at home.

In partnership with our hot lunch provider HCL, an exciting lunch area has been created in our school hall. This has made lunchtimes an enjoyable experience.

As the school returns to a greater degree of normality, we hope to extend an invitation to families to visit the site and enjoy a tour of our facilities.

Our local Rex Cinema

Pinner Road, Northwood Hills



Built for Oscar Deutsch's chain of Odeon Theatres. In September 1936, the architect (A. Douglas Clare) unfortunately died just before the proposed opening date. Almost

everything was ready, even the Odeon name was installed on the façade.

So, in mid-November 1936 the building was sold to the small independent Shipman & King. The Rex sign was mounted over the Odeon name and on 28th December 1936 the first films shown were *"All In"* with Ralph Lynn and *"Border Flight"* with Frances Farmer.

The single-screen auditorium of stalls and balcony levels had a massive 1,000 seats.

The decorative scheme was Art Deco, with a deeply banded central plaster cove fixtures in the main ceiling and foyer and decorative plaster wall panels typical of the time.

The Rex Cinema played concurrent to either the Astoria Cinema or Rivoli Cinema in Ruislip, which were also operated by Shipman & King.

Last film: 22nd September 1973 with Roger Moore in *"Live and Let Die"*.

The cinema was then demolished and a Somerfield supermarket built on the site.

This too has been replaced, with a block of flats and shops.

Fun Facts for Us and the Kids about Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs are wonderful creatures that inhabit our gardens, but sadly their numbers are dwindling. We appear to have lost over half our hedgehogs from our countryside since the millennium alone and have lost a third from our towns and cities. The British hedgehog is now officially listed as vulnerable to extinction.



Why are they called hedgehogs? The 'Hedge' part of their name comes from where they build their nests: under hedges, bushes and shrubs. The 'hog' part comes from the small snorting/grunting sound they make which is similar to a pig/warthog. Before this they were called 'Hedgepigs' and 'Urchins' (which led to the naming of Sea Urchins).



How many spines do they

have? Hedgehogs have around 5000 to 7000 spines on their back. These can be raised and lowered to respond to threatening situations.



The hedgehog has a vulnerable stomach, so it curls up into a spiky ball when it is frightened. For example, when predators such as badgers are around. Each quill/spine lasts about a year before dropping out and being replaced.

What are baby hedgehogs called? Hoglets may be found in May, June or July, when the first litters are generally born, and in August to September, when the second litters are born. The average size of a litter is four to five hoglets.

How long do they live? They can live up to 6 years.

Why do hedgehogs hibernate? Hedgehogs have the ability to slow down their metabolism into a dormant state for winter, especially if it's particularly cold and their food is scarce. So, they don't always do so.

They are nocturnal: When we're in bed, they are out and about. As its name suggests they spend the daytime sleeping in hedgerows, or under shrubs.



What's on the menu? Slugs, snails, caterpillars, beetles, earthworms, birds' eggs; sometimes frogs, snakes and carrion. They are lactose intolerant, so milk should never be left for them. Water is perfect! Some people like to feed them dog or cat food.

Their long nose is useful, especially as they do not use their eyes to hunt.

Hedgehogs have a really long snout to help them hunt. It is even ahead of their mouths as it makes it easier to forage for their food. They hunt primarily using their hearing and smell because their eyesight is not very good, (though it is better than ours in the dark!)

Where do hedgehogs live? The best way to provide a nesting option for hedgehogs is by creating a natural feature, such as a compost heap or log pile, as this has the added benefit of encouraging insect prey too. But preferably make it a dry little home. Artificial hedgehog houses (or hibernacula) are also used by hedgehogs and can be really fun to make. There are lots of ideas on the internet, check out the websites for wildlife trusts.



They live alone. Hedgehogs start out on their own after only four to seven weeks of feeding from their mother. They usually then spend their entire lives alone with the exception of pairing up to mate with another hedgehog.

Collective Noun for a group is an "array". It is rare that you will see multiple hedgehogs together in one place other than when mating, but if you do it is called an array.

Little legs need to walk far. When hedgehogs are out to forage for food in the evening, they can travel for up to 2 miles, that's a long way for little legs!

What do hedeghog tracks look like? Hedgehogs can be difficult to detect, but searching for their footprints is a good way of discovering if they are around.

Both the front and back feet have five toes, though often only four toes show up on the tracks. The front feet are wider, and they look like little hands. The back feet are slimmer and longer and leave correspondingly narrower prints.

These hedgehog tracks are from a footprint tunnel. Footprint tunnel kits can be bought or made. And here's another little clue you can look out for...





Make your road a Hedgehog

Street by talking to your neighbours. For hedgehogs one garden just isn't enough. So, try to ensure that your garden links to your neighbours' gardens with a little 13cm square or arched opening through any fence. Try to convince your all neighbours to care about hedgehogs as much as you

do so that you can make a Hedgehog Highway! Even the Ministry of Defence are doing their bit – see their article on page 38.
